# From Our Pastor...



Let me introduce Robert Harley. He was born in Provo, Utah. He got the Juris Doctor degree from the University of West Virginia, and he became a lawyer. I don't know how you see him, but to me, he looks like a typical Caucasian American with blue eyes and brown hair. And I didn't know he was a lawyer and professor, because when I saw him first, he was an actor on television dramas and shows.

Harley became so popular from the beginning of his career as an actor. Korean people loved him, not because he was an American, but because he spoke a perfect Korean dialect, not a standard Korean. He moved in a southeast part of Korea thirty-some years ago, and he learned a perfect dialect from local people. Whatever he spoke, it became a comedy. It was so fun to watch a Caucasian American spoke a perfect Korean dialect. It would probably look like if I speak to you with a strong Southern accent, such as Texas or Alabama.

Harley has lived in Korea for more than three decades. He married a Korean woman and had three children. A couple of years ago, I watched his interview. He said that one day an American tourist found him and spoke to him in English. He surely understood what the person was trying to say, but he said he couldn't answer him in English. He stuttered a lot, and his son, who learned English from a Korean school, translated for him.

Harley was born in the U.S. and got a higher education with a doctoral degree. But after living in Korea and speak in Korean for three decades, he couldn't speak English, but just stuttered. Doesn't it sound familiar? Yes, I'm talking about Moses.

We are having a sermon series on Moses. He is one of the greatest leaders of Israel history. He was one of the two towering figures through the entire Old Testament. When God called him to go and speak to Pharaoh, he said that he was a sheepherder and stuttered. After living in Midian for 40 years and speaking in another language, he surely stuttered a lot. But still, God had a plan and vision for him to do miraculous works. And God used him to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, and they wondered in the wilderness for forty years.

The Israelites encountered so many challenges in the wilderness. They had to adjust their lifestyle. They couldn't stay in a place and farm, so Manna, which God provided was the only resource for a living. Despite the new lifestyle, we find that God has trained and transformed them into totally new people of God. And Moses built their new social structure and trained their young generations to be the next leaders in the Promised Land.

In this Pandemic era, we encounter so many "new" things, and it becomes a "new" lifestyle. With Moses' story, why don't we learn about this historical figure and learn about ourselves and God's calling in our lives and our church? God used Moses, a sheepherder, for God's work. And I believe God has a vision and plan for you and me and our church. Amen.

### **TRUSTEES' PROJECTS MOVE FORWARD!**

Although the pandemic has slowed the trustees' projects for this year, they are pressing forward to be in service to our church and to the Lord. Three projects are in process at this time.

On May 19th, the Administrative Council approved the estimates for two of these projects. Kevin Wolf and Sons will be replacing the sidewalk next to the planter as well as concreting the five planting holes in the parking lot. The sidewalk has been badly deteriorating and has become a tripping hazard. The ash trees that were in the planting holes were diseased and needed to be removed.

Another project that was approved was repair and restoration of the stained glass windows in the chapel. During last fall's work day, Joe Gatz had noticed that the window was bowing. Willet Hauser, a world renowned stained glass company, was contacted and evaluated the window. The bowing will be corrected, and a new safer protective outside window will be installed over the stained glass.

The third project for this year is to update the women's restroom in the nursery wing. Due to social distancing requirements, this project probably will occur in August or September. The restroom will be painted, a double sink vanity will be installed, and new flooring will be laid. Additionally, the boys' restroom and the nursery restroom will receive new flooring too.
